They saw exhibits and asked questions of the junior and senior Rowan STEM students about your research. We also visited the Planetarium between STEM sessions.

We are done cataloging outdated chemicals and specimen from the Science Department. The extensive list was sent to the Gloucester County Hazardous Waste. Disposal will be on May 17th. Since we are a small district, we only send materials every 5 years.

Memis- involved in 2 professional development activities:

- Working collaboratively and remotely with a consortium of in and out state Biology teachers to align Biology Modeling program from the American Modeling Teacher's Association with NGSS. (project to be completed by June 30th)
- 2) Will be working collaboratively with Biology teachers at Clearview Regional High School this summer to revise and improve Biology modeling program. (July 21 -25, 11:30-3:30)

Biology – The current unit deals with genetics. Students learn about DNA, its role in heredity, & how it gives instructions for cell processes. We are currently discussing how traits are passed to offspring. Students completed and analyzed Punnett squares to trace the path of certain traits in organisms. Students also completed the first of two performance tasks for this unit. This task had students analyze the genetic characteristics of some hypothetical seeds. They worked through a scenario in which a seed company sold bags of seeds that guaranteed a specific trait. They had to determine it that is true and also determine if the next generation of plants from those seeds would contain the trait.

Human Anatomy – The current unit deals with communication, control, and integration. Students learn about the nervous and endocrine systems and how they are the "command" centers. We discuss how the brain provides voluntary movements, interpretation and integration of senses, consciousness, and cognitive function. Also, students discover the relationship that exists between both systems. The performance task for this unit has students in the role of a research scientist researching a specific drug

and its effect on two different systems, more specifically, the communication, control, and integration pathways and components of these systems.

BUSINESS/TECHNOLOGY/FCS DEPARTMENTS

Foreign Exchange Club

A very successful trip to Spain was held for the 2014 Foreign Exchange Club members! The students were outstanding stepping out of their comfort zones. They were greeted by the Mayor of Vitoria and they represented our school and country gracefully. Students had the opportunity to be surrounded by the language and culture. Their families were all very kind, warm, and welcoming. This year the group visited Bilbao, San Sebastian, Madrid, and our home-base: Vitoria. Ms. Yanez used Facebook to keep parents updated with many pictures of their children having a blast. The tentative dates for next year's scholastic exchange are from March 28th to April 11th. It is time to start finding homes for about 25 Spaniards!

Spanish Courses (Honors Spanish 3 and College Prep 1)

Ms. Yanez contacted technology to setup Skype on one of the student laptops and a username and password for her sub teacher, Mr. Cuff. Thanks to him, students of all classes had the opportunity to virtually visit Colegio San Viator, our sister school in Spain via Skype.

Students worked diligently on the work that was left for them and are currently presenting what they prepared while working with Mr. Cuff. Level 1 and level 3 students prepared a trip to 5 Spanish speaking cities. They were to include an itemized budget, maps, itineraries, etc.

CP Spanish 1 students also had the opportunity to learn about the Dominican Republic under Trujillo's dictatorship through the film "In the Time of the Butterflies", a movie based on Julia Alvarez's novel about the Mirabal sisters, which inspired the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women. There were pre and post activities that went along with the main ideas of the movie.

Honors Spanish 3 students read about the Treaty of Madrid, slavery and colonization of South America, and watched the 1987 Oscar winning movie: The Mission. Again, pre and post activities were available to students to understand the historical context of the film.

French

Madame continues to do a letter exchange between her students and students at Bullock school. Madame has moved to her activities unit and Les Miserables unit with her students.

Madame volunteered & helped decorate/organize the Soph Hop by supplying materials, doing announcements, visiting classes to promote ticket sales, monitoring and supervising students at meetings and the night of decorating when their class advisors were unable to stay, communicating with donated food suppliers, and working with sophomore parents and students on the decorating itself. Parents and students were very grateful to Madame her help to the class advisors and class.

Glassboro's Got Talent in March was very successful. Finalists were able to showcase their talents. Madame was able to donate \$1000 to help support the Class of 2016. The remaining money of approximately \$800 raised was deposited into the French Club/Trip account. Madame had the after-prom parents sell refreshments to support the after-prom.

Madame continues to advise the French Club. The French Club had a well-attended movie night in April on a Friday to watch the film "Les Miserables." Over 30 students participated and brought food as well.

Madame held two meetings to promote the France 2015 trip. One meeting was held with students and another with parents/students. Students have been enrolling regularly. Madame expects to have her total of French students participating in the trip noted by the end of May.

Art

ENGLISH/SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENTS

English I READ 180 students are engaged in daily writing assignments which require them to provide textual evidence from the reading passages under study. Ms. Baldiserro's class also wrote personal narratives about money after studying texts on the economy.

CP English I: Baldissero- Students are studying *Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet* using task rotation assignments and collaborative assignments. Mr. Wood will be taking students to see a production of the play at the Shakespeare Company in Philadelphia this month.

CP English II: Ms. Baldiserro is working with Steve Hempel our literacy coach. The class is studying *I am Malala* parts I and II and using response journals and reading through a critical lens. Students will be going to the Holocaust Museum in Washington D.C. this month.

Honors English III Hartman-students read Of Mice and Men and practiced close reading strategies to analyze passages for style and tone as well as theme.
