ATHLETICS

HEALTH & PHYSICAL EDUCATION

TECHNOLOGY

The GHS staff continues to request the use of Google Docs for student and staff file sharing. The technology department has offered the implementation of Microsoft 365 as a compromise. Most staff members are not pleased with this solution. Training is needed for either of these programs.

MISCELLANEOUS

In November GHS celebrated Epilepsy Awareness Month. GHS Senior Ashley Kulikowski spearheaded the effort with two short assemblies during Unit Lunch on November 4th and 5th. Ashley also sold t-shirts to raise funds for Clayton's Hope a charity that helps to raise awareness about Epilepsy. Students filled out slips of papers with the fears they were dropping as a result of Ashley's "Fearless Campaign" and these were posted on a large poster in the main hallway. The month culminated with a charity volleyball tournament called "Volley for the Cure which was held on Tuesday, 11.25.14. Seven student teams participated and one faculty team participated in this fun event.

On 11.10.14, Dr. Sneathen hosted her first "Chat with the Principal." This event was well attended by 7 staff members and 12 parents. Some of the discussion topics were: Unit Lunch, Technology, JROTC, the Referendum, the Late Policy, PSAT's, Freshman Orientation, Back to School Night modifications, and Drivers Education. A spring time chat will be scheduled to keep the lines of communication open.

GHS partnered with a Rowan Fraternity to assist them with their "Stuff the Bus" food drive and it was very successful with the student body bringing in 1,503 items in just four days. Dr. Sneathen turned this into a competition among the 40 or so homerooms in the building with the winning homeroom winning a breakfast. Ms. White's class won with the highest ratio of items to students and they were treated to breakfast at PB Diner by Dr. Sneathen on 11,20,14.

On November 13, 2014, GHS hosted a Veteran's Appreciation Event as our "One Book" celebration in the Gym that was very well attended by the community. The program included student readings, choir and band performances as well as a service dog demonstration and a basic training demonstration by Veteran's. Afterwards there was a reception in the library. An entire committee planned this event for over a month and we were very pleased with the outcome. There is some talk of making this an annual event.

On Monday, 11.17.14, Dr. Sneathen a Capital Needs Meeting held at the Board Office to learn more about the future of referendum in our district.

On Tuesday, 11.18.14, the GHS Guidance Department hosted an 8th Grade Open House for parents interested in learning more about our programs here at GHS. The band and the

cheerleaders performed, as well as a string quartet. Over 40 families attended the evening which was a success.

During the week of November 17-21st, the Friends of Rachel Club held an Operation Christmas Child drive in which homerooms were challenged to fill a shoebox with small gifts for a child in a third world country. MATH/SCIENCE DEPARTMENTS

STEM Academy has registered 8 students for the spring semester @ Rowan. We had 4 out of district and 23 Glassboro students apply. We are waiting to hear how many of the 4 open Choice seats will be available to STEM. Last year, STEM could only accept 2 out of district students due to the CAP. We are meeting on Monday to review the out of district applications and essays. We must notify the out of district students by 12/19.

Scores from the October 2014 HSPA will be available on December 19th. Detailed results are posted January 2nd. Any student deemed not proficient at this stage will participate in the January 2015 AHSA. After the January 2015 AHSA, students have two additional opportunities to demonstrate proficiency prior to graduation (March 2015 HSPA & April 2015 AHSA), and one additional opportunity prior to September (July 2015 AHSA).

The Science department is continuing their discussions on re-sequencing courses due to the new NGSS. The Math department is continuing their discussions on renaming and revising the Interactive courses for the new PARCC testing.

French

Instruction:

French II students finished their fashion show performance-based assessment at the end of the unit. French IV Honors students are reading "La Belle et la Bete". Madame is organizing a trip to Bullock School on Dec. 19th with her French 4 Honors students to present Beauty and the Beast as a puppet show. Following the French puppet show, students will travel to a French Chocolatrium for a full immersion French tour of chocolate making by a French pastry chef.

Miscellaneous:

Madame continues to advise the French Club. She met with officers during Unit Lunch and after school with the entire French Club. The November meetings revolved around Thanksgiving. Students participated in French challenges using vocabulary for Thanksgiving in French as well as physical challenges.

Madame continues to organize the France Trip for 2015 by checking on registrations with EF Tours and communicating with students. There are 14 students traveling this year. Madame is meeting with students during unit lunch checking on their passports, reviewing French, safety guidelines, and all other important information.

As dual credit coordinator with CCC, Madame has submitted registrations for the fall semester to Camden County College. We currently have a total of 16 students registered for dual credit for French, Italian, Spanish, or Early Childhood Education.

Madame and Mr. Beaver work together as advisors to the Class of 2016. The class is running a weekly bake sale after school on Wednesdays as a fundraiser. The officers and senators met during Unit Lunch weekly and afterschool.

ENGLISH/SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENTS

Mr. Wood's Honors English I: Students recently completed Literature Circles, or group projects designed to allow students to work at their own pace with group members to study a novel of their choosing. Popular selections included *Brave New World* and *All Quiet on the Western Front*. Students also analyzed Marcus Luttrell's *Lone Survivor* and explored ways in which the various factions of the American media can interpret the same events.

Mr. Wood's CP English I students completed Literature Circle projects at the beginning of the month – complete with a day of food that students found in their books and then prepared for their classmates to taste. We also studied narrative writing by reading and analyzing the dramatic plot development of three short stories, which included satire and science fiction.

M. Morrison's CP English I class finished *The Odyssey* and completed an Electronic Hero High Yearbook showing comprehension and motivation of characters in an Epic Poem.

M. Morrison's Language Arts I read a novel and completed mini research projects to answer questions they had after reading.

M. Morrison's English Language Learners read the novel, *The Circuit_* and began reading *Enrique's Journey*. (non-fiction)

Mr. Wood's CP English II students began studying argumentative writing techniques in depth. They learned various ways advertisers can be persuasive -- including appeals to ethos, pathos, and logos. At the end of the month, students began outlining a formal persuasive essay which will be delivered to the class using visual aids and practiced public speaking techniques.

Mrs. Hartman's Honors English III students completed a unit on human trafficking. They analyzed the speeches of Frederick Douglass for persuasive and rhetorical techniques, conducted group discussions on the novel *Sold* by Patricia McCormick and wrote essays proposing a solution that high school students could adopt for a specific form of trafficking. SAT prep and vocab development continue.

Mr. Preston: Students in both AP Literature and CP English IV class have been working with British Romantic poetry, reading such prolific poets as Keats, Wordsworth and Coleridge. Most recently, students completed a reflective study and analysis of Coleridge's *Rime of the Ancient Mariner*. The AP Literature class will be working to create a Romantic Poem (a ballad, lyric poem, narrative poem, Petrarchan sonnet), hopefully inspired by an upcoming trip to Longwood Gardens in Kennett Square, PA.

Christina Duffey's English 3 Resource Room class just completed their children's books. They learned about the elements of a story, and then had to develop a story with those elements for second-third grade readers.

Over 200 people attended our Veterans Appreciation Event on Nov 13th which was inspired by this year's One Book Glassboro reading selection Until Tuesday by Luis Carlos Montalvan. Special thanks to Dr. Sneathen and English and Social Studies teachers who spearheaded the event with help from many other departments: Mrs. Hartman, Mr. Wood, Mrs. Baldissero, Mrs. Morrison, Ms. Evans Ms. Callahan, Mr. Cino and Ms. Jones. Mr. Hemmes, Ms. Syvertsen, Ms. Abrams, Mrs. Brown, Mrs. Spadafora, Ms. Thomas, Mr. Myers and Ms. Keating were also very helpful in preparing for the event.
