# BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT

Glassboro High School January, 2014 Dr. Danielle F. Sneathen

### A. ATHLETICS

1. Having difficulty finding a new school doctor to administer sports physicals and cover home football games in the fall. Several pending state laws are making the process problematic.

### B. ACTIVITIES

1. Class of 2015 is sponsoring a student/faculty basketball game as a fundraiser on February 26, 2014. Jamey Cleary, the Junior Class advisor, is running the fundraising event.

## C. HEALTH & PHYSICAL EDUCATION

- 1. The staff has been working on their SGO analysis from the first semester fitness test scores and the students are reaching their goals.
- 2. The staff expressed a concern about class sizes. See personnel below.
- 3. Currently all physical education classes are being pre-tested in the physical fitness tests. Due to facility restrictions and weather temperatures the pacer test is being substituted for the mile run. The other tests are sit and reach, pull-ups, sit ups, and shuttle run.
- 4. Ms. Phillips is teaching health during the first cycle (22 days). Her 9<sup>th</sup> graders are being taught the human sexuality unit and the seniors are being taught First Aid and CPR. Seniors will have the opportunity to obtain CPR certification at the end of the course.

## 2. PERSONNEL

## A. Athletic:

1. The AD has interviewed and is in the process of recommending a new head coach for softball and boys tennis, two assistant softball coaches, an assistant boys track & field coach and a substitute athletic trainer for Danielle Williams as she will be out on maternity leave beginning on March 7<sup>th</sup>. The AD is compiling certifications, finger printing approvals and other documentation for these candidates. The AD is still working on finding an assistant Junior Varsity baseball coach.

# B. Health & Physical Education

1. The Physical Education department members expressed a concern in the area of personnel. Since the budget crunch three/four years ago, the department has been operating without the services of a Half-Time Health/Physical Education teacher. Previously, this shared teacher taught 2 sections of PE at GHS. This staff reduction has increased class sizes to 35 to 40 students in one class. It becomes a problem when there are 3 or 4 classes scheduled in one block which can lead to as many as 105 to 160 students in the gym at one time. The AD suggests that either a full or at least a part-time instructor be added to the department, so that class sizes can be at a safe and manageable size.

## 3. FACILITIES AND TRANSPORTATION

- A. Several athletic buses have been late picking up teams for away games. but the athletic department is continuing to work with Mrs. Spencer to resolve the problem.
- B. Championship banners for the Tri-County Conference and All-State student athletes still need to be rehung.
- C. Wall mats in the auxiliary gym/wrestling room need to be re-glued to the wall as per QSAC review.

## 4. BUDGET AND FINANCE

A. The 2014-15 athletic budget has been completed and entered into Systems 3000. An effort was made to stay within the recommended amount that Mr. Pudelko presented. A justification was submitted for the additional funds requested. These monies are needed to keep the programs operating at the bare minimum. Mr. Pudelko has a copy of the operating cost for each sport and each recommended sport. Please see the prioritized wish list with costs below:

## MATH/SCIENCE DEPARTMENTS

Ten seniors will take the MARCH HSPA on March 4<sup>th</sup>. These ten students will receive their JANUARY AHSA results on March 21<sup>st</sup>. Anyone not demonstrating proficiency on the JANUARY AHSA will participate in the APRIL AHSA.

The MARCH HSPA results will be available by Memorial Day. The April AHSA results will be available by the first week in June. Any student not demonstrating proficiency by June will not be able to receive their diploma or participate in graduation activities. A JULY AHSA is available.

10 Pedagogy students from Rowan will be observing our math teachers from 2/6-4/17. Big thanks to Mr. Beaver, Mr. Wisniewski, Mr. Rulon and Mrs. Stewart for assisting the future educators.

Mr. Morrison will be making his annual trip to the JETS competition with our math students. Good Luck!

Mrs. Keating will be making her annual trip to the GCC Technology Fair for Women.

Our 3 STEM students are taking spring courses @ Rowan in Calculus 3, Freshman Engineering Clinic II and Biology. We wish them well this semester.

Biology – The current unit is an UbD unit dealing with the building blocks of life. Students learn about the 4 major macromolecules, including their functions, importance to our bodies, why we need all four, and what would happen if we took one away. Students also learn that enzymes are vital for cellular processes and what conditions affect them. In our first lab of the course, the Toothpickase lab, students will play the role of enzymes metabolizing substrate (toothpicks) under various conditions (higher concentration of enzymes, lower concentration of substrate, competitive inhibitors, and temperature). They then analyze their data to determine the affect each alteration has on the rate of the reaction.

Human Anatomy – Students are starting their first UbD unit, Introduction to the Human

Body. Students learn anatomical and directional terms used by medical personnel and why it is important to have a specialized, universal language. We will also discuss what it means to be alive and how the different systems play a role in that. Students also learn about the importance of homeostasis to survival, including how the body knows when something is out of sorts and how it fixes it. We completed one activity in which students used anatomical & directional terms to locate points on the body. This activity involved one student describing locations on the body, using only the terms, so that their partner could correctly mark that location on a body outline. We will also do two mini performance assessments. For the first task their mission is to write a description of a sport action (such as riding a bike) using complex anatomical terminology. They must describe all body parts, directions, actions, and sport equipment in descriptive terms. Descriptions will be given to classmates, allowing other students to determine the sport they are playing and/or the skill they are performing. For the second performance task students will be given a scenario involving a disruption of homeostasis. They are required to identify the human body system primarily and directly affected by their situation. They then have to explain how this body system functions normally and compare/contrast that information with how this system responds to the homeostatic crisis. Then students discuss other body systems that work with the primary system to maintain homeostasis.

#### WORLD LANGUAGE/MUSIC/ART DEPARTMENTS

The World Language Department hosted another successful Multicultural Festival on 1.16.14. The evening was well attended and after the multicultural feast in the cafeteria the students displayed their talents in performances on the GHS stage. Both the food portions and performances went well.

Madame's fall semester students completed their exit interviews and Le Petit Prince performance-based assessment successfully. Madame Kruse is now currently teaching French III honors and two sections of French I this spring semester. Students are just getting introduced or reacquainted with French.

Madame is producing Glassboro's Got Talent again this year. She ran auditions and 10 finalists/groups have been selected for the show. She is busy organizing the show, acquiring judges, filming clips used for a montage at the show, and coaching the finalists as they prepare for the show itself on March 14<sup>th</sup>. The show serves as a fundraiser which will support the Class of 2016 and some expenses for the trip to France in 2015.

Madame was selected as Teacher of the Month at Glassboro High School.

Madame continues to advise the French Club. Many members have participated monthly in recipe contests, learning about the French holidays, and pumpkin decorating this fall. The club is planning a French scavenger hunt, movie night, and possible restaurant trip for the spring.

Madame continues to volunteer running an independent study with a senior who has a scheduling conflict for French III and IV honors.

Madame has submitted information with regards to next year's trip to France to Dr. Sneathen. Dr. Sneathen will be sharing that information with Dr. Silverstein and the board for approval so that Madame can proceed with organizing the trip. Madame expects to have a student meeting of interested future juniors and seniors in February.

Madame continues to serve as a member of the SLT, school leadership team.

The Music Department held its annual Tri-M Musical Honor Society Induction Ceremony on 1.23.14. After the ceremony, a benefit concert was held in which students and staff performed.

The Music Department held the annual Glassboro Idol contest on 1.30.14. This year's winner was Enrica Iacovone but all of the students performed beautifully.

#### ENGLISH/SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENTS

Students in Mrs. George's Humanities Class performed skits based on popular musicals.

English I Read 180: In January, students completed Workshop 4, "The Science of Happiness." Students read scientific, survey-based, and periodical texts that discussed what made people their age happy. At the reading table, students created mock iPhone screens, complete with apps and contact lists, for characters they are reading about in their books. Students continue their vocabulary and Scholastic software studies, and most have several full-length novels by this time independently.

Students in Mrs. George's Read 180 2 class significantly improved their lexile scores since last tested in October.

English I CP: In the month of January, students tackled Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet." In addition to regular journal writing and vocabulary exercises, many students fell in love with Shakespeare (and *along with* him) unexpectedly. Some students emerged as natural dramatists during class readings, and most enjoyed writing in Middle English and artificially aging paper during the Lost Letters of Verona Project. Students composed formal, expository essays of literary analysis discussing themes and characters in the play.

Debates and Persuasive Speeches were performed by 10<sup>th</sup> graders in Ms. Evans' classes.

Students in Mrs. George and Mrs. Hartman's English III classes completed an MLA style research paper. Mrs. Hartman's class also completed a unit on political protest practicing open ended response writing with textual evidence in the process.

Mock Trial Moderated by Mr. Cino

"This year GHS competed for the 8<sup>th</sup> consecutive year in the NJ State Bar Foundation Mock Trial Competition. This year's trial was a criminal case where the defendant, Sid

Sawyer, was accused of vehicular manslaughter. The competition this year was tough as GHS had to face off against two of the perennial county powers - Washington Twp. and Kingsway. We unfortunately lost our first two cases and were eliminated from the competition but the students did an excellent job preparing and performing their arguments. It was disappointing to be eliminated so early in the competition but the team is rife with dedicated underclassman who show a lot of promise and give much hope for the upcoming years."
