English/Social Studies

Hartman: Honors English I students studied the Journey of the Hero and created posters to illustrate the concept in a modern film. They studied the conventions of epic poems and wrote essays using textual evidence from the poem to support a theme. They continue to broaden their vocabulary each week and practiced subject verb agreement skills to improve their writing and grammar skills.

Evans: Honors English II has read *Night* and *The Sunflower* and is currently reading *The Book Thief* is preparation for a Holocaust Unit by Ms. Evans' MST student Jordan Faulkner.

Hartman: Honors English III students completed a unit on slavery studying the *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass* and comparing it to contemporary human trafficking by reading Patricia Mc Cormick's book *Sold*. Students wrote poetic vignettes in the style of the book and began the research process by identifying a contemporary problem and generating open ended questions about it. They made sure their research topic was feasible by creating a preliminary source list using Ebscohost and online resources.

Mrs. Alexis George and Mrs. Duffey: English IV College Prep students completed pilgrimage projects based on *The Canterbury Tales*. This project teaches students how to write six stanzas in a poem about themselves. They have to pick a place in the high school that they will really miss and write about it. We then take a "pilgrimage" to their location where they will read/or have their poems read aloud.

The yearbook has begun work on its second deadline.

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Mrs. Baldisserro and Ms. Jones along with Renaissance Club have been planning a pajama party with Santa for the community to take place in December.

Business

DECA students collected a total of 408 pairs of socks during the "Save the Toe-Toes – Heat the Feet" sock collection. Girl Scout Brownie Troop 62703 assisted and contributed 81 pairs of socks for the cause! The socks will be delivered to local shelters and the Cathedral Soup Kitchen in Camden, New Jersey during the first week of December.

The DECA Consumer Bowl Team has been selected and includes the following DECA members: Gulden Ozdemir (Captain), Kendyl Tranchina, Megan Lord, Michael Turner, and Dylan Acri (alternate). Students will begin preparing for the 2016 County Competition which is scheduled for February 9, 2016.

First Semester MOUS students are currently preparing for the MS Word 2013 Certification Exam. Currently 9 out of 30 students have already passed the exam for MS Word 2013. Twenty-three out of 30 passed the MS PowerPoint 2013 exam and 19 out of 30 passed the MS Excel 2013 exam.

All Financial Literacy classes are researching stocks and Mutual Funds in order to participate in the Stock Market and Mutual Fund Game. Each student will create a stock portfolio and a Mutual Fund portfolio and will track their gains and losses.

Life Learners Academy

Math/Science/STEM

STEM students competed twice in IEEE robotics competition at Rowan. GHS was the only HS team at the competition. We competed against Drexel, Rowan, and Maryland, among others. In the second competition our GHS students placed 5th.

GIS STEM is working on reverse engineering with fans and vacuums from the Dyson Foundation.

Our Lego robotics kits and our Sea Perch (Underwater robotics) are HERE! We will begin working with those after the holidays.

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STEM teachers are registering for a PLTW STEM Conference at Rowan.

STEM teachers met with GSEG to discuss our vision and expectations.

Mrs. Keating attended a STEM workshop at Rowan with keynote speaker, Dr. Ken Lacovara.

There are nineteen seniors who have not been cleared for graduation. Of these nineteen, 6 have been cleared in mathematics, but not English. These students have the following opportunities in order to demonstrate proficiency: SATs in December, January, March, or April, ASVAB in December, ACT in February or April, or an Accuplacer. Students receive math instruction daily and are able to attend tutoring before school, during lunch, or after school.

Band

The <u>GHS Band Program</u> is preparing for upcoming performances in and outside the school. The Winter Band concert will feature the Concert Band, Jazz Ensemble and other small ensembles. Ensembles such as the Saxophone Quartet and Brassboro, a mixed instrument ensemble, will perform for the Glassboro Tree Lighting on December 5th and for senior citizens at Pitman Manor, Summit Place and the Glassboro Senior Center on December 21st.

Three GHS students performed with the Rowan University Pep Band at the GHS open house for the academy program on November 9th. (Veronica Menna, Kody Johnson and Brenden Finely)

Three GHS band members and one GIS band member participated in the Youth Brass Band Festival at Rowan University on November 22nd. The event is sponsored by Rowan Prep and the Atlantic Brass Band. The students rehearsed selections to perform as a group and along with Atlantic Brass Band. (Kody Johnson, Kate Appleby-Wineberg, Peter Hodson and Julianna Menna)

GHS Marching Band

The Marching Band performed in the follow Pitman Christmas Parade on November 28th. The band will perform at the Salem Christmas Parade and the West Cape May Christmas Parade on December 5th.

The Marching Band performed for the Bowe School band students on November 3rd as a part of its recruiting and outreach activities. The band performed its field show in the gymnasium.

Art

Ms. Clements and Mr. Hemmes went to visit with Al Valentino the Graphics Teacher at Buena Regional High School. Mr. Hemmes and Ms. Clements are working on a course proposal for Graphic Design Courses 1 & 2.

The Art Department will be showcasing student artwork at the December Coffee House for GHS.

Spanish

College Prep Spanish Level 2

Students in this level have been learning about clothing items, how to describe what people are wearing, what clothes reflect about the person wearing the clothes, and differences between cultures, including currency exchanges when shopping for clothes or other items. Students are currently working on their fashion show performances. The fashion show will take place on Wednesday, December 9th and an assigned crew from Mr. Henderson's TV program will film the event.

Soon students will be learning about the seasons, how and why seasons are opposite in some parts of the world, and what impact the weather has on clothing and other aspects of a culture.

Honors Spanish Level 4

Students are currently learning the beginning of the Spanish novel Don Quixote de la Mancha. Students read, summarize, and illustrate each chapter either in class of for homework. Parallel to this, students are reviewing question formation and applying verb tense knowledge in so doing.

Soon students will learn about seasons and how that affects the holidays celebrated in different Hispanic cultures.
