Spanish

French

Instruction:

French II students are in their second unit focused on physical description. They look forward to their fashion show performance-based assessment at the end of the unit. French IV Honors students are reading "La Belle et la Bete" and hope to do a skit for world language students at Bullock before the end of the semester.

Miscellaneous:

Madame continues to advise the French Club. She met with officers during Unit Lunch and after school with the entire French Club. The October meeting consisted of a French-themed pumpkin decorating contest with senior Devon Downes' group winning.

Madame continues to organize the France Trip for 2015 by checking on registrations with EF Tours and communicating with students. There are 15 students traveling this year. Madame is meeting with students during unit lunch checking on their passports, reviewing French, safety guidelines, and all other important information.

As dual credit coordinator with CCC, Madame has distributed materials to the world language teachers and Early Childhood education teacher. Madame presented a power point to the students about the benefits of enrolling. All teachers are turning in enrollments to Madame before Thanksgiving break so that she can register the students in the courses at Camden County College.

Madame and Mr. Beaver work together as advisors to the Class of 2016. The class managed to win homecoming overall as well as many of the separate competitions during the week. They were very positively spirited and worked so well together. The class is running a weekly bake sale after school on Wednesdays as a fundraiser. The officers and senators met during Unit Lunch weekly and afterschool during the month of October.

Madame held a District World Language Curriculum Meeting on Oct. 30, 2014 with Bullock, Bowe, GIS, and GHS teachers. Plans are underway to collaborate during the school year between buildings and coordinate the annual Multicultural Festival.

ENGLISH/SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENTS

Cino: SGA

At the beginning of the month GHS Student Government Association helped to organize another successful Homecoming. The festivities started with a heated battle on the gridiron as each class competed in the annual Powder Puff game. The Sophomore class repeated as champions and are looking to be the first four time champions since the vaunted Class of 2006. The Homecoming activities continued with Spirit Week as students came dressed in different themes each day. Monday was "Sports Day" Tuesday was "Mismatch Day" Wednesday "Disney Day" and Thursday "Maroon and Gold Day" (Students were off on Friday for teacher in-service). The week culminated in a pep rally where each class participated in various competitions. There was also a service component to Homecoming as each class competes in a canned food drive. This year SGA was able to collect over 2000 different items that were then donated to the Samaritan Center in Glassboro. This year's overall Homecoming theme was Reality TV Shows and each class created a float and a skit that represented that theme. Unfortunately, rain prevented the Homecoming parade from happening but we were still able to hold the float/skit competition. After a week-long competition the Juniors came out as Homecoming champions, followed by the Seniors, Sophomores, and Freshman. The week culminated in the Homecoming Dance Saturday night which was attended by over 300 students.

Cino United States History I:

The students in the United States History I courses were delving into the topic of the Civil War. They examined the issues that arose as the country continued to expand, the subsequent wars that ensued (War of 1812 and the War with Mexico), and the sectional tension that developed. Students were asked to look at the Civil War as an attempt by the South to gain independence. So students used the essential questions: Why do revolutions occur? Was the Civil War avoidable? to focus their studies.

Honors United States History II:

Students in the United States History II course were busy examining the effects of the Great Depression and trying to see what lessons from the past can be applied to today. Students focused on the essential questions: What should the role of government be during times of economic downturn? How effective was FDR in dealing with the problems of the Great Depression? In an effort to explore these questions students examined works by prominent historical scholars both supporting and critiquing FDR and his New Deal polices. They were also asked to compare and contrast the issues facing the nation in our recent "Great Recession" with those that FDR had to deal with during the Great Depression. Finally, students were asked to write an essay supporting or criticizing New Deal policies and they had to take a stance on what policies they think the government should take in the future when faced with similar situations.

Christina Duffey's English 4 Resource Room class just completed their "educational autobiographies." Students had to reflect upon their 12 (13 including kindergarten) years of school. They wrote about what they remember learning, their teachers (teaching styles), as well as memorable experiences. Students then completed a puzzle piece, in which they had to decorate a puzzle (piece) that reflects them. Each puzzle piece

represents the students as individuals and shows how they are connected to one another (their community).

Maureen Morrison's Ninth grade Language Arts completed a Novel Unit for <u>The Education of Little Tree</u> and began mini history research project based on questions students created upon completion of book (Trail of Tears, Author Study, Great Depression, Native American Boarding Schools)

October 31st Vocabulary Costume Project- English I students dressed up as S.A.T vocabulary words and presented costumes during blocks 1 and 4.

Mrs. Baldissero's Test Prep class completed the October HSPA state exam then created individualized notecards analyzing personal areas of growth for each student. After the exam students began to work on building a portfolio of different genres of writing. Each student has been working on journal entries to formulate an opinion on a relevant topic in the news and use persuasive language to argue a claim. They read the short story "The Sky is Gray" by Ernest J. Gaines and watched a film clip explaining how his life story is a larger part of American history.

Mrs. Baldissero's English Language Arts class began their study of Greek Mythology implementing the Text, Lens, and Patterns reading strategy. The focus of instruction was the 15 Greek Concepts and the seven stages to the Journey of the Hero. Students were exposed to creation stories through text and through film clips and were then asked to analyze both to help better prepare them for the PARCC. The ELMO facilitates tessons as struggling students view student samples annotations and practice the skill independently.

Mrs. Baldissero's and Mr. Wood's College Prep English class began the study of *The Odyssey with a web* based search to learn the aspects of an Epic poem. The students expressed great success in learning the academic language of the time of *The Odyssey* through their search and the TPT questions that followed sporadically during whole group reading sessions. The college prep students have broken into base groups during independent reading and group work to encourage students to learn from one another and take a leading role in the learning within the classroom. Mr. Wood's students also created travel brochures that highlighted the adventures of Odysseus and the lessons he learned along the way.

Mr. Wood's Honors English I students, along with daily writing and vocabulary assignments, completed a Journey of the Hero poster/essay project that asked them to isolate and analyze the theories of Joseph Campbell in a contemporary feature film. Students also completed their studies of the Odyssey by utilizing the writing process to compose, edit and peer-revise expository essays of literary analysis.

Mr. Wood's students in English II CP completed reading and performing the ancient Greek tragedy Antigone. Students researched other famous political dissidents and composed short biographies. Students utilized computer technology to research and assemble slideshows on ancient Greek culture. Students are currently completing

Literature Circle Projects, extended group activities that ask them to read and write about an independent novel.

Students in Ms. Evans Honors English II and Hartman's Honors English III wrote essays on the importance of veterans for the Voice of Democracy Contest. The winner will read their essay at the Veterans Appreciation event in November.

Ms. Hartman's Honors English III completed a unit on the Salem Witch Trials reading The Crucible and analyzing similarities to the Red Scare of the 1950's. Creative Writing students wrote myths and horror stories and extended metaphors in addition to journal writing and independent writing activities. Mrs. Hartman took students to see the author of Until Tuesday, Luis Carlos Montalvan, at Cumberland County College
