English/Social Studies

George: Freshman worked on reading, "13 Reasons Why." Throughout the unit, teachers modeled successful reading techniques and strategies. Students are currently participating in an intense Writer's Workshop in relation to the novel.

Evans: English II student have been finalizing their speeches/debates.

Wood: Students read several Arthurian Legends, including *Sir Gawain and the Green Knight* and *Le Morte D'Arthur*. To learn about chivalry, students created their own family crests, complete with heraldry and Latin mottos, and each class formed their own chivalric codes in an attempt to hold each other to high moral standards. Students then moved onto a unit of studying famous speeches, including the Gettysburg Address and portions of a lesser-known address at Gettysburg by delivered by Edward Everett. The unit culminated in an essay called "I Also Have a Dream," in which students wrote about their own hopes and wishes for the future of America.

Hartman: CP English III completed a novel unit on *Of Mice and Men* practicing text-based responses and close reading strategies as well as journal response. Students also complete the 12th and final vocabulary lesson and a unit on subject verb agreement.

George: Students in CP English 4 read, *Macbeth* and participated in a mini research paper regarding Shakespeare. Seniors also created a "Senior Scrapbook." This scrapbook assignment was created by Mrs. George and contains eight components.

The publications staff and members of the Outdoors club had the amazing experience of sailing aboard NJ's Tall Ship, the AJ Meerwald. This was made possible by a generous scholarship from the Bayshore Discovery Project.

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Tina Spadafora had a speaker the Friday before Memorial Day named Edward Sabir, a Vietnam Veteran whose uncle, Frank Collier, was a Tuskegee Airman. The kids enjoyed his visit and learned a great deal about both historical events from an African American perspective.



Business

DECA students attended the Six Flags Great Adventure Business & Marketing Day Challenge on May 12, 2016. The students prepared three different Marketing Plans for a multi-organizational fundraising event. Although the students did not place in the competition this year, they learned a lot about marketing and fundraising activities and attended a heart-warming presentation from representatives of the Special Olympics.

Introduction to Computer Programming students are finalizing their computer games that they developed. Upon completion, they will be available on the STEM website for your enjoyment.

The Little Bulldogs Nursery School Program (Early Childhood Education 1/Child Development)) is ending this week, with a “Circus/Carnival” theme celebration, after a very successful 11 week schedule.

Honors Education Students (Early Childhood Education 2) are finishing the field experience section of their curriculum, at Bullock School. We are very thankful for those teachers who open their classrooms for us every year. Without them, these students would not experience “the real thing.”

Math/Science/STEM

GHS STEM teachers are moving forward and looking to incorporate PLTW for grade 8.

We are purchasing Vex Robotics for the GIS STEM and Project Engineering classes.

Ms. Keating met with Dr. Issam Abi-El-Mona at Rowan to discuss STEM and our partnership with Rowan.

Mr. Morrison held his last Engineering Club meeting at GIS PAC bldg. and had a former GHS graduate conduct a drone demonstration.

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Every regular education member of the Class of 2016 has cleared mathematics to graduate by a state approved assessment! No one needed a portfolio to be cleared in math.

Ninth grade Biology students of Mrs. Memis and Ms. Chattopadhyay (Woodrow Wilson Fellow from Rowan) recently completed a unit on biotechnology and the ethics involved in manipulating DNA. Each group performed at least one biotechnology lab; Lab Bio extracted DNA from strawberries and completed a simulation to demonstrate how transgenic organisms can form. Honors Bio performed a gel electrophoresis procedure to understand how DNA fragments can be separated and analyzed. Each group of students also explored the costs, risks and benefits of genetically modified organisms in the food industry.

Art

Art Club displayed work and participated in the “Coffee Haus” held on Thursday evening May 26th.

Art Club met to brainstorm ideas for next year’s activities.

Ms. Clements attended the Barnes Foundation Trip with Ms. Yanez and her students.

Track surface has cracks that will need repair in the summer. Several head track and field officials have commented on the condition of our track surface. They said it is close to being unsafe for use.

The athletic department needs a JV softball field (at Bowe School) so that the JV softball team has a field to play home games and practice. Currently, they use the JV baseball field that needs maintenance on the skinned infield.

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JV baseball field at Bowe School is improving but the rocks still exist and pose a safety issue. Bus pick up and bring home is still an issue that needs to improve. Recommend the buses always stay with the team when traveling. On several dates, the team needed to wait anywhere from 20 minutes to over an hour after the end of the game for the bus to arrive at the away site.
