Math/Science

A senior has cleared for graduation on his January 2017 SAT SCORES. We now have one senior who has not cleared in English, two seniors who have not cleared in mathematics, and one senior who has not cleared in both subjects for graduation. This is a total of 4 students. Portfolio Appeals have been submitted to the NJDOE for review. We have not heard back. These seniors will take a PSAT in March and an ASVAB in April. They will participate in RCGC's "Get on the Bus" program, and take an ACCUPLACER in late March. They also can sign up for SATs and ACTs at an expense of approximately 50 dollars.

GLASSBORO HIGH SCHOOL March Report

Mrs. Powers and Mrs. Keating toured the Science Bldg. at Rowan to assist with the BioMed Academy.

Rowan's Computer Science Dept. met with Mrs. Keating regarding a grant for the implementation of a course titled CS Principals, which is an AP course for Computer Science. STEM teachers are interested in the grant, which includes a summer workshop as well. The course would count towards Rowan credits.

GIS STEM is doing 3D printing in their STEM course.

In Ms. Keefer's Biology classes, students are completing an UbD unit that deals with cell processes including osmosis and diffusion, photosynthesis and cellular respiration, and DNA replication, transcription, and translation. Students are working collaboratively on an osmosis inquiry lab in which they determine how to set up, run, and analyze an experiment to test the factors that influence the movement of water into and out of a plant cell. Students are given an experimental design guide and list of possible materials. It is their job to figure out what they want to use to investigate which types of environments/solutions will cause either a loss or gain of water from cells of a plant. They will then run their experiment, collect data and analyze their results to explain why they got their results and why this happened.

In Ms. Keefer's Human Anatomy class students are completing an UbD unit that deals with membranes, tissues, & skin. Students with learn about the various membranes and tissues that are found in the body and that make up skin. They will also determine that skin is an organ that contains different appendages. We will discuss how skin helps maintain homeostasis and how it is affected by a number of disorders. During the unit students work cooperatively to complete a lab activity that includes testing tactile localization, plotting the distribution of sweat glands, mapping skin sensitivity, and observing the properties of different substances on skin. At the conclusion of the unit, students will work with their groups to create a blog about a topic relating to membranes, tissues, or skin/skin appendages. This blog includes a "How much do you know?" quiz that can be taken to assess prior knowledge of a topic, a "Did you know?" section that provides relevant facts and information about their specific topic, and a prevention section that could be used to help someone avoid issues related to their topic.

English/Social Studies

George ELA 1: Students in this yearlong course signed up for the Achieve 3000 contest along with several other classes. Students use the online program to practice reading and writing strategies found on the PARCC using up-to date high-interest articles to get them motivated. Students also studied mythology and continued to learn and employ SAT vocab words

Duffey: English 3 classes are exploring career options for life after graduation. Guidance intern Cassie Bower came in to do career interest inventories. Students will then explore careers based on the results.

Hartman: Honors English III students wrote business cover letters explaining their previous experience in Language Arts and evaluating their strengths and weaknesses. After analyzing its structure, students imitated the style of George Ella Lyon and wrote a "Where I'm From" poem.

They used interactive grammar software and Kahoot to study sentence construction and punctuation and used summary and analysis skills to write their first formal reaction paper on one of the non-fiction articles that they receive and respond to each week. Students continue to respond to independent novels in journals and expand their word knowledge by creating individualized vocabulary lists while also completing SAT vocabulary practice units weekly.

George English IV: Students in this course were given pre-assessments in reading, writing, vocabulary and grammar in order to plan for instruction. Students studies the epic hero, read the epic poem Beowulf and developed vocabulary. They also wrote two essays during the month of February: a literary analysis pertaining to Beowulf and a piece offering freshman advice regarding success in high school.

George: Fine Arts Exploration: Students in this course took part in a three-day mini-exploration of drama, music, and TV Tech with Mrs. George, Mrs. Neglia, and Ms. Yanez. They will explore these areas and eventually work more intensively in one discipline to create a school-wide lip dub/video expressing Bulldog Pride.

Lynn Hartman went to Washington Township High School with a team of teachers to investigate one-to-one laptop strategies and applications.

Mrs. Hartman along with Ms. Evans and Mr. Cino, took 40 students to Camden County College's Main Stage Theater to see a production of The Diary of Anne Frank. Students had the opportunity to engage in a very powerful Q and A session with a Holocaust survivor who had been hidden and raised as a Catholic during the Nazi occupation of Paris.

Business

On February 13, 2017, DECA Consumer Bowl students Gulden Ozdemir, Megan Lord, Dylan Acri and Frank Fazzolari competed in the Gloucester County Consumer Bowl Competition and finished in 3rd place.

DECA members are currently working on the Six Flags Great Adventure Business and Marketing Day 2017 Challenge. This year the students are to create a proposal to promote a non-profit organization and create a challenge, (the best example of this is the ALS Ice Bucket Challenge), that can be done on social media to raise money for the cause. The students need to create a hashtag to go along with the challenge.

Introduction to Computer Programming students are currently working on designing and developing computer games using GameMaker software. The students will be printing their main character from their game using the 3D printer.

Sports & Entertainment Marketing students are completing the **Sport Drink Label** activity. Students create a new sport drink designed to meet the needs and wants of their target market. This is a fun activity that demonstrates mastery of the target market and demographics concepts, while integrating publishing and other technology skills.

The Black Culture Club steppers performed at GIS on February 23. The Black Culture Club celebrated Black History Month by decorating the building with information and living up the
