ATHLETICS

Award ceremonies have be rescheduled for the following dates: winter sports- March 9th @ 7pm and June 4th @ 7pm.

A Glassboro first, A.J. Kittles was selected Men's Basketball player of the Week for the state of New Jersey. A.J. is the first student athlete selected for this honor at Glassboro High School.

All evaluations of head coaches have been completed and Mr. Cusack is scheduling post season meetings this week. All Head Coaches will be recommended to return for

next year.

The upcoming PARCC testing will require the use of all of our mobile labs for the month of March and most of the month of May. The teachers have been notified not to plan any lessons using the laptop carts in those months.

MISCELLANEOUS

The Red Cross Blood Drive was held on 12.5.14 in the GHS Gym.

Randomly selected classes at GHS participated in the NJ Youth Tobacco Survey on 12.9.14.

Dr. Sneathen attended the After Prom Meeting on 12.8.14, the Music Boosters fundraiser Breakfast with Santa on 12.13.14, the Band Concert on 12.16.14 and the Choir/Orchestra Concert on 12.18.14.

On 12.19.14, Dr. Sneathen, Officer Marchese and Ms. Ragozzino met with a representative from The Brain Injury Alliance of New Jersey. GHS will be a 2014-15 Champion School and will be awarded \$1,000.00 grant to develop programs to promote teen driving safety. Planning meetings will be scheduled in the near future to facilitate this new initiative.

On 12.22.14, Ms. White and Dr. Sneathen met with representatives from Rowan University to begin planning our schools participation in the Get Fit program for some of our Special Needs students.

MATH/SCIENCE DEPARTMENTS

Of the 16 seniors enrolled in Senior Test Prep, 6 have now demonstrated proficiency.

10 students have the following opportunities to demonstrate proficiency:

- 1. January 2015 AHSA
- 2. March 2015 HSPA
- 3. April 2014 AHSA
- 4. July 2015 AHSA (occurs after graduation ceremony)

Detailed results are in from the October 2014 AHSA.

We will have ten students completing the AHSA process. All of these students will take the HSPA again in March. Should a student not demonstrate proficiency on the January 2015 AHSA or the March 2015 HSPA, there will be one more opportunity prior to graduation- the April 2015 AHSA.

There is an additional chance in July 2015. However, a student needing to take this opportunity would not be allowed to participate in graduation ceremonies.

The STEM committee met to review the out of district applications and we can only accept 2 out-of-district candidate for the 2015-2016 school year per the DOE Cap imposed on the School Choice Program. We sent the other students a "waiting list" letter if the Cap is lifted. We are continuing to write letters to appeal the Cap.

Art

Two art interviews/portfolios were reviewed for the Art Academy: Meredith Owen from Pitman and Jasmine Johnson from Clayton, both are in 8th grade currently.

A GHS Graduate and former Art student, Caitlin Clements, who now works for Rowan University's Art Department, came in to talk with the Fine Arts class about all of the available art majors at the college. The students learned about the new art major that combines art and science and the students create medical illustrations for science journals and hospital presentations.

French

French IV students did an outstanding job both teaching and presenting the French story "Beauty and the Beast" to Bullock students. They did a puppet show and completely immersed them in French. French II students are beginning their final unit on the town.

Madame continues to advise the French Club. Our December meeting included a holiday celebration and a yule log French cake contest which groups of students participated in. Colleagues came to help judge the competition.

Madame continues to organize the France Trip for 2015. There are 14 students traveling this year. Madame is meeting with students during unit lunch checking on their

passports, reviewing French, safety guidelines, and all other important information. She has an evening parent meeting scheduled for January 21st.

Madame and Mr. Beaver work together as advisors to the Class of 2016. The class is running a weekly bake sale after school on Wednesdays as a fundraiser. The officers and senators met during Unit Lunch weekly and afterschool.

Madame has begun advertising the auditions for Glassboro's Got Talent. Auditions will be held on January 23rd. This year's show serves as a fundraiser for the France trip students.

ENGLISH/SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENTS

Mrs. Baldissero's Test Prep class read critically to understand the uprising at the Auschwitz Concentration Camp, citing textual evidence to support a well-constructed analysis of the physical and emotional responses that were seen in the concentration camps. The students also wrote letters to the participants.

At the end of December the students received their scores from the October 2014 HSPA exam. All three passed with scores 5-10 pts higher and one student scored advanced proficient.

Mrs. Baldissero's English Language Arts Class focused on writing a subject analysis on *The Odyssey*. Students found textual evidence to support which character was an epic hero in an analytical essay. Students spent time studying compositional risk in order to attempt compositional risk in their own papers and were provided with past student samples and a number of anchor posters to facilitate a productive writing environment.

Mrs. Baldissero's College Prep English Class read the play *Romeo and Juliet while* using the Text, Lens, and Patterns reading strategy. Each student tracked the development of characters and their interactions throughout the play. Students also studied the gender differences of the 1200-1400's in Italy to understand the depth and motivations of the characters. Throughout the reading they completed a reading response project that was based on exchanging letters on a topic from the play engaging in a meaningful written conversation. At the end of the play each student created a masquerade mask to wear to our Masquerade Ball that was held during class on December 19th.

December was all about poetry in Mr. Wood's English classes. Students in English I, English II, and Honors English I read, recited, analyzed, and composed their own original poetry portfolios, which included sonnets, narrative poetry, villanelles and other forms. Popular poets included Robert Frost, William Shakespeare, and Sylvia Plath.

The Publications class met their first deadline. Ms. Evans started a public speaking/research unit with her Honors English II students in preparation for their debate.

Mrs. Hartman's Honors English III students completed notes and drafting for a 5-8 page MLA style problem/solution research paper. They also studied Social Realism and Naturalism while reading the novel Of Mice and Men. They then compared it to the film and the parody.

Mrs. Hartman's Creative Writing students completed recipe poems, studied graphic novels, wrote cartoons using Pixton comic creator and practiced writing captions for cartoons as they completed a unit on graphica.

A PLC for Social Studies Assessments was formed along with a One Book PLC which includes teachers from English and Social Studies.
