#### **ENGLISH/HISTORY**

The One Book, One Glassboro Committee selected *Educated: A Memoir* by Tara Westover as the 2019 One Book for our community. Limited copies will be available in the GHS library and at the Glassboro Public Library. Keep an eye out for a community-wide event in the fall.

The English Dept. has finalized summer reading for Honors and Advanced Placement students for the 2019-2020 school year. Information can be found on the website for incoming freshman as well.

CP English II- Students finished *The Things They Carried* and completed several close reads that focused on character development, style, and purpose. Students viewed Wes Moore's TED Talk about communicating with veterans and compared it to John Steinbeck's "Why Soldiers Won't Talk". They created Google Slides presentations that discussed theme and character development. Students took the NJSLA (formerly known as PARCC).

H. English II-Students completed the assessment for *Night*. The final assessment of *Night* also included an analytical essay in which students compared the Yiddish and current endings of *Night* through Wiesel's use of rhetoric and tone. Students received a choice reading assignment and were introduced to the final unit of the curriculum. Students read informational texts about Tennessee Williams' life and writing inspiration. Students took the NJSLA (formerly known as PARCC).

ELA I-Students took the NJSLA (formerly known as PARCC). Students completed a cumulative exam on Units 1-3 as well as a narrative assignment written from the perspective of two of the characters from a text in Units 1-3. Students started reading and annotating Ernest J. Gaines'

"The Sky is Gray." Prior to reading "The Sky is Gray", students viewed a short video clip about Ernest J. Gaines' childhood and life as a writer. Students complete one skill via IXL on a weekly basis; this assists with mechanics, reading comprehension, and grammar.

#### **BUSINESS**

All of the MOS received TestOut certification and are prepared to take the Microsoft Office Certification Exams in Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and Access.

Students in Financial Literacy have participated in the Marketwatch game by buying and selling stocks and mutual funds. Students also analyzed various investments and the risks associated with investing.

Their final project allowed them to create a vision for their future. They chose a career, researched the knowledge and skills necessary to obtain that career. They shopped for houses, apartments, groceries, vacations, furniture and cars. They also completed a 5 year cash flow based on their career choice and research.

# Ms. Rynkiewicz reports:

There are 22 uncleared juniors (rising seniors). We are awaiting Spring PARCC Results. Students may take an SAT and/or an ACT over the summer. Any student not cleared by September 1st will be enrolled in Senior Test Prep under the direction of Ms. Rynkiewicz for mathematics sand Ms. Faulkner for English Students will take the ASVAB in September, the PSAT in October, and have multiple opportunities for SATs and ACTs in the Fall.

There are 62 uncleared sophomores (rising juniors). NJBOE released assessments and cut scores for this class. Previously, this class had to prove proficiency on the Algebra 1 PARCC and the ELA10 PARCC. Now, members of this class can use the alternate pathways: PSAT, SAT, ACT, ACCUPLACER (WRITEPLACER/NEXTGEN QAS) and/or ASVAB. These 62 students are to be enrolled in basic skills instruction in the fall.
