As of October 31, 2016 there are 15 students enrolled in the Alternative Evening High School. Eight students currently have an IEP and are serviced by a special education teacher. Two students are part-time. There are 4 students in the BD classroom. There is one student who is in 8th grade and is being taught by a teacher from GIS.

There were 0 new entrants into the ESL Program for the district this month.

For the month of October, there were 0 students transfer out of district.

No students were assessed for entry in or out of the ESL/BE Program during October.

Administration has decided that Pre-Kindergarten services will be provided in the form of ELL specialist to teacher collaboration with weekly meeting dates set for the first Wednesday morning of each month. Kindergarten will receive daily guided reading lessons infused with content instruction and supports. Grades one thru third will receive daily push-in or pull-out instruction with guided reading, content instruction, and language arts skill support as well as the upper grades. Additionally, for the first time, a Bilingual program to address the specific needs of our Spanish-speaking population in grades Kindergarten, First, and Second has been initiated.

For the month of October, all registered ELLs were taught with ESL instruction. Translation services were provided as needed for meetings, positive phone calls needed to be made for homeroom teachers, in addition to the normal positive phone calls, and other inquiries. Ashley Miles began her employment with GPS on October 11th. Mrs. Johnson has been in contact with her since August and trained her the first week she arrived.

Mrs. Johnson participated in the PD on using Technology during Read Alouds presented by Aaron Edwards on October 14th. Each group gave a presentation; Mrs. Johnson presented a power point entitled, Eliza and the Dragonfly which supported her ELLs' baseline SGO for DLB. Additionally, on October 28th, she attended a training session offered by the NJDOE in Trenton entitled, Experienced BE/ESL/ELS Supervisors Training. The purpose in going was to make sure that the district is up-to-date with standards, testing, and other hot-topic items.

Mrs. Johnson has been accepted into Mrs. Sochor's OG Program of study for this fall. She is hopeful that this program will teach her additional strategies and procedures so that she may better serve the needs of her ELLs. She has been meeting for training every Wednesday.

The ESL/BE Department has a meeting scheduled for November 1st.

B. Title I - Basic Skills Improvement Program

During the month of October, the kindergarten BSI students worked on the following skills: phonemic awareness rhyme, syllable segmentation, phoneme segmentation and initial sounds. Students reviewed the terms consonant and vowel. The upper and lower case letters T, I, U, J, C, G, O and Q were introduced along with the sounds they make and vocabulary pictures that coordinate with each letter. A variety of multi-sensory activities using Orton Gillingham and Project Read strategies were used.

The sight words it, help, look, not, brown, the, am play, little, up, no, and down were introduced.

FUNdations Unit 1-5 Tests administered to determine skills learned from kindergarten and units needing review.

FIRST GRADE:

59 students were serviced in literacy during the month of October. One student exited October 5. ($56-1=55$). There were two new entries and one re-entry. ($55+3=58$). Peale services 24 and Matteo services 26. Eight are ESL or in an inclusion classroom. ($58-8=50$.)

Matteo used the FUNdations Program and worked with students reviewing consonant and short vowel sounds, printing upper and lower case letters, and on making and reading CVC words with magnetic tiles, sounds symbol cards, and writing them on dry erase boards. Peale on the other hand, emphasized rhyming during the month of October with her LLI students. One of the books the students read entitled, *Our Garden*. led Peale to take her students to the Bullock garden to see what was still growing and to smell various plants. Students were very excited to visit out garden and Peale found it very amusing to see them smell fresh mint for the first time.

The current total first graders in literacy basic skills by October 28, 2016 is 50.

SECOND GRADE:

The of students for Math BSI (11) + total for Literacy BSI (49). There were three new entries in literacy. ($49+3=52+11=63-9(\text{both services})=54$ in grade 2. Seven are in an inclusion room. ($54-7=47$) Both DeFrank and McConnell are utilizing the LLI Program with emphasis on fluency, consonant clusters, and Dolch words. DeFrank services 18 students, McConnell services 26, Peale services one, and 7 are in an inclusion/ESL classroom ($47+7=54$). In math with Flaig, second grade students worked on addition and subtraction fact fluency within 10, place value, and relating base ten numbers in all forms (standard, expanded, unit, and word).

The current total of second grade basic skill students is 47.

THIRD

GRADE:

The total of third graders in literacy basic skills was 23, and for mathematics the

total was 13. There were four new entries in math and one re-entry. ($13+5=18$) In math, Flaig worked with her students on estimating to the nearest ten using tape diagrams, skip counting and multiplication fact fluency through 4. Eight students received both services. ($23+18=41-8=33$).

The current total of third grade basic skill students is 33.

Areas of Special Interest:

DeFrank and McConnell serve on Bullock's CAST Team which meets twice a month. Matteo attended CAST for two first grade students on October 7. The Glassboro Fire Department visited Bullock on Thursday October 13 and presented tips on Fire Safety during Fire Prevention Week. Bullock's annual Halloween Costume Parade was held on Friday October 28 at 1:30PM.

Conferences and Workshops Attended:

On Friday, October 14, there was a two-hour delay within the district to allow time for teachers to collaborate. The BSI Team was asked to sit in on the training for Achieve 3000, a computer to be utilized with third graders. Peale was excited about the program and all of the non-fiction articles available for students to read. However, it was disappointing to learn that BSI will not be using this program with first graders, as a separate program would need to be purchased for licensing.

The June F & P benchmarks scores as well as the SRI for Read 180 were used for assessment.

As October began, Mrs. Rencher, Mrs. LoCastro, and Mrs. Hart met with their respective LLI and Skills Groups. They have been working hard with their groups going over classroom rules, procedures for the LLI program, as well as classroom procedures. The students have become familiar with the program and The Read 180 program is now taught by Mrs. Rencher, Mrs. LoCastro, Mrs. Stump, and Mrs. Marchese, as part of the afterschool program. It is held on Tuesday and Thursday, 3:15-4:15, from October through May.

During the month of October, Mrs. LoCastro and Mrs. Rencher worked with 7 ESL students until the new ESL teacher began at Bowe, which was the 15th of October. They worked on skills groups and vocabulary development activities with them.

Mrs. Hart was unable to use the System 44 program with the three students, as the licenses were never transferred over from Bullock to Bowe. Beginning in November, she will be observing Mrs. Stump teach this program as well as continued training in the program, and then start using it with her students as the licenses were finally transferred at the end of October.

During this month, Mrs. LoCastro and Mrs. Rencher continued to work with the PDS committee. The Real Men Read and Battle of the Books programs also began. Students who participate in both programs will be reading books on their independent reading level throughout the year. Both Mrs. LoCastro and Mrs. Rencher participate in Real Men Read, while Mrs. LoCastro, Mrs. Hart, and Mrs. Rencher participate in Battle of the Books.

Students took part in the Lucy Calkins Units of Study Writing Workshop, finishing up Unit 1: Narrative Writing. Throughout the program, students worked one-on-one with the teacher to hone in on individual needs and to improve upon weaknesses. Emphasis was on the following writing skills:

- Writing “short”
- Concentrating on the Who? What? When? Where? Why? And How?
- Organization
- Descriptive details
- A unified focus—short yet powerful
- Writer’s craft
- Usage, Sentence Construction, and Mechanics

The sophomores in Mrs. Saphire's BSI classes have been learning about test-taking strategies. They have been given tips to identify and correct common grammar, word choice, and punctuation errors in their writing and speaking as well as on standardized tests.

Having reviewed a number of common grammar, word choice, and punctuation errors and ways to correct them, students were exposed to a variety of test styles and types of questions. The lesson also focused on the proper uses of quotations and related punctuation such as where to place the comma, period, exclamation point, question mark and semi-colon when quoting. The students simulated the testing environment, administered sample tests, and then the students compared their answers to the key.

Students have been engaged in these lessons. Many of the students approached the PSATs with more confidence and knowledge than in the past.

No students exited the program in October.

The program emphasis for the month of October was to engage in test taking strategies for the PSAT and the SAT, practice reading comprehension, and expose the students to a variety of vocabulary words to enhance their reading, writing, and vocabulary skills.

Each day the students practice reading comprehension skills by reading and answering questions to a Newsela article. Each student would complete this individually, then as a group the teacher and students would conduct a close read that would focus on word choice and author's tone. The students would then transition into vocabulary practice. The vocabulary practice consisted of guess the definition of words based on context clues, completing exercises, and playing interactive vocabulary games that got the students up and out of their seats, while rotating and quizzing each other. Each day the students and teacher would end class with a small portion of reading comprehension from practice PSAT and SAT packets.

Ms. Baldissero has been working with guidance to keep the lines of communication open so everyone in administration, parents, students, and teachers are all aware of where the students stands behaviorally.
