I. GLASSBORO ALTERNATIVE EVENING HIGH SCHOOL Rob Hemmes, Head Teacher

INSTRUCTION / STUDENT NOTES:

- As of December 31, 2024 there are 20 high school students attending AEHS full time and one Bowe School Student.
- They are working with the GHS Administration team to transition several of the students back to the day school program at the end of January in time for the 3rd Marking Period.
- They continue to meet monthly with the CST and High School Administration working to provide a smooth transition to and from the High School Program
- They continue working on getting the students in classes in PowerSchool so parents and administration can see the most up to date information as in day school, currently they are only listed in a homeroom.
- AEHS students will begin with the Yondr phone pouches in January.
- Paper Report Cards/Progress are being mailed out to all parents to update them on attendance and grades.
- Transportation has been a great help getting the students here on time and safely back home.
- They are working towards including Music in the AEHS Curriculum. This will fill in one of the Elective spots for students and not impact the original budget.
- Students are currently taking all their major subjects including Math, Science, History, and English. Students are also taking a business and language elective

New entrants to the district who were identified as multilingual learners through Home Language Surveys, were then assessed using the WIDA screener to determine eligibility for ESL services. Notices were mailed to parents to inform them of their eligibility.

Students who scored close to the exiting score of 4.5 on the WIDA ACCESS in spring 2024 were assessed with the WIDA MODEL assessment for mid-year exiting. Five 4th grade students, one 5th, one 8th, two 9th, one 10th, and two 11th grade students met the exit criteria and will exit ESL classes at the end of the second marking period.

Pre-Kindergarten students are identified and receive consultation services through collaboration between the ESL teacher and the classroom teacher as needed. Kindergarten through 5th grade receive daily skill-based lessons in addition to vocabulary instruction based on the Wit & Wisdom lesson/module the class is currently focusing on as well as support in the Fundations program through either a push-in or pull-out model based on students' level of language proficiency. Grades 6 through 12 receive content instruction, and language arts skill support for one period each day. The transition has been made to a sheltered instruction model for all students and all teachers who are instructing Multilingual Learners were given 15 hours of Sheltered English Instruction training through Stockton University's SEI online training modules. Those who were not already trained will be provided professional development and training utilizing the modules through Stockton University.

At J. Harvey Rodgers School, all kindergarten students were assessed on knowledge of the letters and sounds through a screener given by Mrs. Owens in addition to the MAP fluency assessment. Students in the lowest scoring tier were identified for services through Basic Skills Instruction (BSI). Consent forms were sent home, once

they are signed and returned, students will begin BSI services. The program will focus on the following: phonemic awareness skills: rhyme, syllable segmentation, phoneme segmentation and identifying initial sounds in consonant-vowel-consonant words. The upper- and lower-case letters will be introduced along with the sounds they make and vocabulary pictures that coordinate with each letter. A variety of multi-sensory activities using Orton Gillingham and Science of Reading strategies will be used.

At Dorothy L. Bullock School, students were progress monitored to check progress. Each BSI teacher had students who met their goal and exited for a total of 13 exits – see chart above for grade level totals. Once Winter MAP testing is complete, new students will be entered to take the place of those who exited the program. With one BSI teacher at DLB currently covering a long-term substitute classroom assignment, new entrants for services are limited until Mrs. Giroux returns to her role as a BSI teacher. Students are progress monitored utilizing the Fundations Progress Monitoring assessments, the Heggerty phonemic awareness screeners, and sight word knowledge. Students in the program will continue to receive 30 minutes of daily Basic Skills instruction in English Language Arts (ELA) through either push-in or pull-out supplemental teaching models focusing on phonics and phonemic awareness skills and/or a focus on foundational literacy skills. A variety of multi-sensory activities using Orton Gillingham and Science of Reading strategies will be used. Assessment data is used to determine the specific skills/concepts that are needed to teach/reinforce and for creation of goals and instructional groups for tiered interventions and differentiation.

Basic Skills teachers at all levels will collaborate with classroom teachers to enhance and support the skills being taught in the classroom. The number of students in the chart above are students who are currently receiving services. The parents/guardians of those students have received consent forms and notification of services. In addition to BSI services, classroom teachers will provide the necessary support through differentiation/tiered supports. The students who were exited in the spring of 2024 will continue to be monitored by the BSI staff in addition to their classroom teachers to ensure they are maintaining the skills that they were taught through BSI interventions. If concerns arise, students are eligible to re-enter the program for remediation.

Extended School Day programs are currently being implemented two days a week in grades 3-12. Students in grades 3-5 were chosen according to MAP scores to participate in tutoring sessions after school in math which will be taught in small groups by Bullock certificated staff. Students in grades 6-8 will receive targeted instruction based on needs in both ELA and math and will be chosen by MAP scores and teacher referral. GHS provides tutoring services to students who choose to stay and work in small groups with certificated staff in any area of need.

Planning:

- 3. Dr. Preston said whoever takes over the position for him, he will make sure he tells them all Science Fair committee members get their Friday off to help. (Update: Since custodial staff is now responsible for the breakdown of tables and cleanup of projects, it is no longer necessary for the entire committee to have coverage for their Friday classes. When table order is placed, we need to evaluate how many are needed.)

- 10. Need a check off list for high school students who are participating. (This is referring to check-in as we had issues last year.)
- 11. Need to bold or highlight on the science fair directions that NO names and NO pictures of students faces can be on the projects. (Update the science fair packet.)
- 12. Sound system person for microphone (Check with Art or Elisa to see if they are available. They will be paid hourly rate.)
- 13. Get door prizes for more interest. (Since we are currently struggling to get donations for winners, we will hold off on this for now.)
- 14. Need more lanyards for the medals for next year. They are running low. (Check inventory and place place order on Amazon through Bernadette.)
- 15. GHS student involvement in fair; Make STEAM Academy students mandatory (Do not make them back to back. Check in with Susan Powers to see how many projects she anticipates for submission this year. Incentivize the Biomed students to participate as per Dr. Silverstein.)
- 16. Get the Science Fair advertised on the front page of the website, people complained they couldn't find information on the website. (Discuss in January) 17. After the first date and date approved, make flyers to hand out and advertise to students in all buildings. Get each building to add Science Fair to morning announcements. - winners from last year and get the Pre-K and K students more interested. (Shannon will make a flyer on Canva to distribute to the group in the next month or two.)

- 20. Need 30 swag bags to cover all winners. High School students didn't get bags this year. (Erin needs some help with reaching out to new potential donors as it has been difficult for her to find willing participants.)
- 21. People were walking through gym doors when judges were present. We need to make a sign saying Gym Closed, Judging in progress. (Move judging time forward, push back public time, if students are late they should be permitted to enter with projects.)
- 22. In need of more judges, could we ask Rowan science students or more Rowan teachers? (Mr. Smith and Mr. Dong from Physics department at Rowan are able to judge. Mrs. Montana will judge projects since she won't be on the committee. Find more teacher judges?)
