REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS FROM THE CHIEF ACADEMIC OFFICER Danielle M. Sochor

I. <u>GLASSBORO ALTERNATIVE EVENING HIGH SCHOOL</u> Robin Boyd, Head Teacher

As of September 30, 2016 there are 14 students enrolled in the Alternative Evening High School. Eight students currently have an IEP and are serviced by a special education teacher. Two students are part-time. There are 4 students in the BD classroom.

II. STATE AND FEDERAL PROGRAMS

A. <u>English As A Second Language</u> Rona Johnson: ESL Teacher Pre-K – 2nd Grade

Number of children currently in the program: Mrs. Johnson has 52 ELLs, and the district-wide breakdown is listed below.

District-wide Enrollment:

There were 22 new entrants into the ESL Program for the district this month.

For the month of September, 7 students transferred out of district. Another 25 students exited out of the program with the ACCESS for ELLs Spring 16 exam and one student graduated out of 12th grade.

Mrs. Johnson administered 30 WAPT exams to determine eligibility of incoming students.

Administration has decided that Pre-Kindergarten services will be provided in the form of ELL specialist to teacher collaboration with weekly meeting dates set for the first Wednesday morning of each month. Kindergarten will receive daily guided reading lessons infused with content instruction and supports. Grades one thru third will receive daily push-in or pull-out instruction with guided reading, content instruction, and language arts skill support as well as the upper grades. Additionally, for the first time, a Bilingual program was initiated to address the specific needs of the Spanish-speaking population in grades one and two.

For the month of September, all incoming ELLs were accessed for services. Translation services were provided as needed for meetings, positive phone calls needed to be made for homeroom teachers, in addition to Mrs. Johnson's normal positive phone calls, and other inquiries. Due to the shortage in staffing, Mrs. Johnson has been supplying ESL services to GIS in the form of a modified/structured literature circle for grades 7/8 and consultation to Bowe while awaiting the start of Ashley Miles. Full services to all buildings should take place in October.

Mrs. Johnson attended two days of professional development provided by GPSD on September 6th & 7th on Cultural Relevance in our schools and how to meet the diverse populations as well as PD on using Technology during Read Alouds presented by Aaron Edwards.

Mrs. Johnson has been accepted into Mrs. Sochor's OG Program of study for this fall. She is hopeful that this program will teach her additional strategies and procedures so that she may better serve the needs of the ELLs. She has been meeting for training every Wednesday.

B. Title I - Basic Skills Improvement Program

Charlene White: Basic Skills Coordinator J. Harvey Rodgers School

New entrants tested into the program: All new kindergarten registrations were administered to kindergarten KDI and letters/sounds assessment by Mrs. White. No students exited the program.

Mrs. White's services began on September 26, 2016. The Letters Pp and Bb were introduced along with the sight words: see, can and at.

Mari Kay Heyel-Matteo: Basic Skills Coordinator Dorothy L. Bullock School

Number of children currently in the program:

Literacy 26 Math

FUNdations Unit 1-5 Tests were administered to determine skills learned from kindergarten and units needing review.

Fountas and Pinnell Benchmark Assessments were administered to new students to determine reading level and BSI eligibility.

DIBELS were administered to grade 1 students to determine eligibility for BSI services.

FIRST GRADE

49 BSI kindergarten students came to Bullock from Rodgers School. Six students transferred (49-6-43). Five students tested out. (43-5=38). There were 19 new entries. (38+19=57). One student re-entered. (57+1=58). Two students are in an inclusion classroom.(58-2=56). Matteo services 26, Peale services 21, and McDermott services 9. (26+21+9=56)

Matteo administered the Kindergarten FUNdations Units 1-5 Tests to her students to determine skill areas of need and units to review in the kindergarten level of FUNdations program. These 26 students came in reading at levels C, B, or A and had low scores on their DIBELS NWF (nonsense word fluency) and LNF(letter naming fluency). They receive phonics instruction daily through the FUNdations program. Most students who benchmarked at a D in June 2016 are going to participate in the Level Literacy Intervention curriculum with Peale. Students who benchmarked C or below (or possible schedule conflicts) are now being taught FUNdations. While most of these student did retain some sight word knowledge and letter skills, there was a natural backslide that occurs in between kindergarten and first grade. The plan is to have them receive LLI this fall in an effort to close the gap between BSI students and their peers.

The current total first graders in literacy basic skills by September 30, 2015 is 56.

SECOND GRADE

The total number of first graders, now second graders in literacy basic skills was 51 in March. Three students were retained in grade 1. (51-3=48). One student was classified in April 2016.(48-1=47). Seven students transferred (47-7=40). One student tested out. (40-1=39). There are 12 new entries. (39+12=51). Two students are in an inclusion room. (51-2=49). DeFrank services 18 and McConnell services

24. McDermott services the 7 inclusion room students. (18+24+7=49). Students with DeFrank are getting started in the second grade LLI Reading program. The major area of focus is fluency, which is reading smoothly as if they are just talking. We have also begun working on consonant clusters. All students are reviewing and practicing Dolch sight words. During the month of September Flaig spent time analysizing math benchmark data and fact fluency from June 2016 to identify students eligible for BSI math assistance. ISIPS were then developed, scheduling completed, permission slips obtained. Students were then visited in class or pulled out to receive reinforcement and remediation in math. Five students were serviced in mathematics in first grade. However, one of those students transferred over the summer. (5-1=4). There were 7 new entries. (4+7=11). Total for Math BSI (11) +total for Literacy BSI (49)=60-9(both services)=51

THIRD GRADE:

The total of second, now third graders, in literacy basic skills was 28 in March, since my last board report submitted in April. However, there were 2 new entries later in March. (28+2=30). There were two new entries in September.(30+2=32). Two students transferred. (32-2=30). One student tested out at reading level M. (30-1=30.) There were 2 re-entries. (30-2=32). Nine of these students are in an inclusion classroom (32-9=23). Moss services 18, DeFrank services 2, and Peale services 1. (18+2+1=21). McDermott services 2 in the ELL room. 21+2=23. During the month of September Flaig spent time analysizing math benchmark data and fact fluency from June 2016 to identify students eligible for BSI math assistance. ISIPS were then developed, scheduling completed, permission slips obtained. Students were then visited in class or pulled out to receive reinforcement and remediation in math. Six students were serviced in mathematics but one student transferred. (6-1=5) One student tested out. (5-1=4). There were 9 new entries. (9+4=13). Total for Literacy 23 + 13 Math=36 -8 serviced for both =28) 28 students are serviced in grade 3.

<u>Areas of Special Interest</u>: Matteo and Peale were available for the first grade visitation on Wednesday August 30, 2016. BSI team met with Mr. Taibi on September 12 to review eligible students and schedules. Staff plan to begin servicing students beginning the week of September 19. Paperwork was sent home the week of September 12. Peale is a member of Bullock's Green Team, formally known as the Bullock's Garden Team. The Green team met with various teachers from the region for an Edible Education Network Meeting on September 20, 2016. Peale learned that both National Park and Clayton have gardens. This meeting was run by Rutgers New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station. Ms. Harris was able to provide details about how our Bullock Garden was started and in turn visitors shared some of their resources.

DeFrank was involved in the Bulldog Buddies meeting on August 25, 2016. Role plays will be held the week of September 12. All staff attended the workshop with Dwayne D. Williams on September 6, 2016 at GHS. This workshop was interesting and presented strategies to implement within the classroom to help Tier 2 students. Terms presented included Communalism, Verve, and Movement. A faculty meeting was held on September 7 and all BSI were in attendance. Taibi presented Bullock's data results in reading and mathematics.

Literacy 53 ELA Students for LLI, 30 ELA Students for Read 180 Math 0 Since this is the beginning of the year, no new students entered the program, and no students exited the program in September.

They used the June F & P benchmarks scores as well as the SRI for Read 180.

During the month of September, the BSI teachers administered the STARR Reading Assessment as well as the Scholastic Reading Inventory. Mrs. Hart, Mrs. LoCastro and Mrs. Rencher analyzed the data collected and used this as well as beginning F & P benchmark levels for September, to determine which students would benefit from LLI instruction, Skills Groups, or the Read 180 program. Once this was determined, students were placed in the appropriate instructional groups and parent permission letters were sent home. They then used time for BSI PLC meetings to continue

training in the LLI (Leveled Literacy Intervention) program. As October begins, they will be meeting with their respective LLI and Skills Groups. The Read 180 program will be taught by Mrs. Rencher, Mrs. LoCastro, Mrs. Stump, and Mrs. Marchese, as part of the afterschool program. It will be taught on Tuesday and Thursday, 3:15-4:15, from October through May.

During the month of October, Mrs. LoCastro and Mrs. Rencher will be working with 7 ESL students until the new ESL teacher begins at Bowe, which will be the end of October. They will be working on skills groups and vocabulary development activities with them.

Mrs. Hart will be working with 3 of her students with the System 44 program and will be observing Mrs. Stump teach this program as well as continued training in the program.

Mrs. Rencher, Mrs. LoCastro, and Mrs. Hart attended How to Improve the Performance of African American Students, presented by Key Note Speaker Dwayne D. Williams. He presented during the September 6, 2016 in-service. Mrs. Rencher and Mrs. LoCastro attended the edconnect workshop at Intermediate School on 9/7/16. They enjoyed this workshop and found value in making common assessments with the help of this site. Mrs. Rencher and Mrs. LoCastro attended the Family engagement workshop as part of EIRC's Network to Close the Achievement Gap. They came away with a few strategies they believe will work within the school and district.

There are 10 new entrants for the 2016-2017 school year. Students were tested using the Fountas and Pinnell reading assessment.

During the month of September and October, focus will be on the study and publishing of narrative writing. Students will take part in the Lucy Calkins Units of Study Writing Workshop. Throughout the program, students will work one-on-one with teacher to hone in on individual needs and improve weaknesses. Emphasis will be on the following writing techniques:

During the month of September, the sophomores in Mrs. Saphire's BSI classes have been working on test-taking strategies in preparation for the upcoming PSATs in October.

This month's focus has been on finding and fixing sentence errors. As a start, students identified the subject/s and verb/s in a sentence and asked themselves if the subject/s and verb/s agreed in number. The students were given lists of simple and complex prepositions to use as they identified and omitted prepositional phrases in order to prove subject-verb agreement.

Students have been extremely cooperated and engaged in these lessons. Since the start of this semester, there has been a significant improvement in the students' abilities to find and fix sentence errors involving subject-verb agreement.

Language Arts: Christi Baldissero <u>High School</u>

Number of children currently in the program:

Literacy9_____ Math_____

The program emphasis for the month of September was to engage in test taking strategies for the ASVAB, practice reading comprehension, and expose the students to a variety of vocabulary words to enhance their reading, writing, and vocabulary skills.

Each day the students practice reading comprehension skills by reading and answering questions to a Newsela article. Each student would complete this individually, then as a group they would conduct a close read that would focus on word choice and author's tone. The students would then transition into vocabulary practice. The vocabulary practice consisted of guess the definition of words based on context clues, completing exercises, and playing interactive vocabulary games that got the students up and out of their seats, while rotating and quizzing each other. Each day they would end class with a small portion of reading comprehension from practice ASVAB packets.

The Test Prep class has remained focused throughout the month of September. They want to graduate and are working hard to achieve that goal.
