

New Revenue for your School.... Put Advertising on Your Buses!

Your district will not incur any cost... it will make money!

New legislation allows schools to accept advertising on buses owned by or leased to school districts.

If your district has its own buses, you may be able to generate revenue.

To help schools take advantage of the new laws, EIRC has instituted a program to:

- Find advertisers that meet State guidelines for advertising on school buses
- Contract for the space
- Produce and apply the advertisements to your buses
- Invoice and process payments for contracted advertising space
- Send your school district the profits.





Frequently asked questions.....

How do I know if we qualify for accepting advertising on our buses?

Right now, the law only allows advertising to be placed on school buses that are owned or leased by a school district. Additionally, your Board of Education must approve it.

What kind of advertising can be placed on school buses?

State regulations spell out the types of advertising not allowed on school buses. Generally, these are products and services related to alcohol, tobacco, prescription drugs or anything of a sexual nature.

How large are the ads?

Advertising space is available in various sizes, depending on the make and model of the bus. The advertisers can choose the spaces they want to match their budgets.

Will we have to maintain the advertisements?

No. EIRC will produce the advertisements and apply them to each bus, and we will maintain them.

A third session entitled "Cyber-empowerment" is an important part of this workshop which delves into the cyber world of today's youth and explores how some electronic communications are opportunities for bullying, bias crimes and violence among students.

This NJ CAP program is available to schools throughout New Jersey. A comprehensive curriculum designed to help school communities make the environment a safer place for all its members by raising awareness, supporting antibullying policies, training adults in appropriate intervention strategies and empowering students to be responsible "witnesses" who care about the rights of those being victimized.

By training local advocates in the CAP program, ICAP enables them to provide this human rights oriented curricula to their schools and community groups.

Currently ICAP oversees a network of over 300 CAP Projects and 35 Regional Training Centers in over 12 Countries and 22 US States.

CAP's PROVEN RESULTS!

CAP Curriculum Evaluations/Studies– ICAP Provides empirical evaluation for its CAP programs. *The following are some of the evaluations available.*

- **Binder and McNiel (USA)** Study found that 5 to 12 year-old children displayed higher knowledge scores on prevention strategies after participating in the **elementary CAP workshop.**
- **Nibert, Cooper and Ford (USA)** The study demonstrated that very young children are able to learn and use prevention strategies (**Preschool CAP Program**).
- Conte and Fogarty (University of Chicago USA) Evaluation took place in elementary schools and found that older children learned and retained more CAP strategies than the younger students.
- Stetic and Vidovic (University of Zagreb, Croatia) Evaluation indicates that CAP improves communication between children, parents and teachers about child abuse.
- Hebert, Lavoie, Piche, Poitras (University of Quebec at Montreal)
 It found that 95% of the children and their parents perceived benefit from attending the elementary CAP workshop.

Assessment:

More Than Just a Grade

Assessment has so many meanings and uses. Accomplished teachers need ways to reliably evaluate student work products and adapt to specific learning needs in all curriculum areas. Join us as we look at how to incorporate higher-order thinking skills throughout the curriculum. In this workshop, we will explore pre-assessment, ongoing, and post-assessment strategies. Through the techniques provided, teachers will be able to monitor students growth more clearly and provide specific interventions.

Data Driven Decision Making

Yes, NCLB requires us to collect and analyze more data in more ways. But the REAL REASON for data collection is to improve instruction and learning. In this workshop, we will examine what data to collect and why, share collection methods, compare reporting methods and examine selected case studies of school districts across the nation that have used data to drive improved student achievement. A portfolio of reference materials and resource information will also be provided.

Behavior

A Personal Approach To Classroom Leadership And Management

The central workshop process is discovering your personal priorities from a comprehensive collection of values. Through the process you will begin to lead and manage with a positive expectancy based on your new clarity and empowerment. In other words, when you see yourself clearly, you will then see your students with a new clarity that will greatly simplify and enhance your experience of being a teacher. We promise that you will see immediate results in your classroom and immediate benefits in other important areas of your life.

Assertive Discipline (Gr. K-12)

This workshop will review a competency based approach to school discipline that works. Participants will learn the risk factors and warning signs that predict student violence. They will learn techniques that give them confidence and reduce their potential for victimization. In addition, participants will develop step-by-step response procedures, learn to deal effectively with disruptions, and develop a crisis intervention plan and aftermath counseling. Emphasis is on the need to develop a comprehensive discipline plan and support team.

Behavior Management At Work in The Classroom

Presented in an interactive style, this workshop for teachers addresses various causes of behavior problems and strategies for re-directing behavior. Emphasis is on speaking and listening to children without intensifying a situation, setting limits and defining expectations. This class includes some theory and a lot of practical information.

Conflict is inevitable; but combat is optional. Participants will leave this workshop with research based strategies to take control of a situation; specific phrases to use to defuse and avoid power struggles; techniques for getting students to talk, think and listen; questioning techniques to get to the specifics of the situation; and strategies to formulate a positive, long term resolution.

Dealing with the Difficult Child

Teachers will learn various "keys" to help manage the difficult child. Participants will explore the reasons children misbehave and/or just refuse to learn. Possible solutions will be explored that will enable teachers to effectively deal with these challenges.


Teaching Impoverished Students





Bringing Out the Einstein...

How equipped are you to encourage children to think, reason, and problem-solve? One Potato, Two Potato...Making Math Come Alive for Preschoolers

The importance of mathematical understanding to managing today's world cannot be argued. Mathematical experiences in early childhood provide a base for children's abilities and attitudes towards math in the future. This workshop is designed for teachers to examine ways in which they can design developmentally sound experiences that will promote the learning of mathematical concepts.

Put Reading First: Phonemic Awareness and Phonics

Phonemic awareness and phonics are sometimes misunderstood. This session will discriminate between the two. "My child plays all day in preschool"..."Why doesn't my child bring home homework?"..."What's my child learning?"..."Is he as smart as the other children?"..."Will my child be Kindergarten?"...These are common ready for questions and concerns of preschool parents. The purpose of this seminar is to help directors/staff address these concerns with parents and to build an awareness of developmentally appropriate practices that are critical in building a good foundation for their preschool child to succeed in school.

The Importance of Play: Addressing Parent Concerns

The value of play as a tool for learning cannot be underestimated. Yet, how do we get parents to "buy in" to this concept and to believe that their children are learning valuable skills while they're playing? How do we, as teachers, plan effectively and facilitate the learning process through play? Workshop participants will explore these aspects and actively discuss strategies that can be utilized in their programs.

Instructional Strategies



Aligning Instruction through the PARCC Transition

Veteran teachers will lead this standards based workshop to help your students achieve higher scores on the state tests! This workshop is filled with practical tips that can be easily implemented in your classes. Learn how to structure your instructional activities with new strategies. Many helpful handouts are included.

Block Scheduling

This workshop provides the classroom teacher with strategies to best utilize their time in a block scheduling environment. Teachers will learn to maximize their extended classroom time by becoming facilitators who engage students in active learning strategies, including creative problem solving, project based learning, and role-playing. Teachers will learn how to work in lab settings, and how to assign roles and tasks for students to use in cooperative learning groups. Classroom resources that are more conducive to block scheduled time allotments will be reviewed and discussed.

Brain Based Learning

What does the literature say about how the brain learns? What do teachers do that stimulates and encourages learning and memory? What teacher behaviors interfere with learning? What is the relationship between emotions and learning? During this workshop you will learn strategies that will boost motivation and enhance your students' learning and memory.

Cooperative Learning Strategies

Cooperative learning is an instructional methodology wherein students maximize their own and each others' learning by working together in small groups. Numerous studies of cooperative learning groups have shown outcomes of higher levels of reasoning and critical thinking, more positive relationships with peers and increased retention of material for longer periods of time. You will be introduced to cooperative learning strategies, how to create cooperative learning groups, how to assess group learning, when to intervene, how to observe, ways to monitor behavior, projects that lend themselves to this methodology, and classroom management techniques.

Creating Engaging Learning Environments to Increase Student Motivation

A motivational climate is a combination of leadership, environment, strategy, student and curriculum components. In this workshop, rich in engagement strategies, teachers will really understand how to create a motivational climate that compels students to enjoy learning while differentiating instruction for different learning levels. With new research in brain-based learning, teachers will participate in hands-on activities to incorporate new strategies into their repertoire and enrich their ability to work effectively with their students.

Differentiated Instruction

Differentiated Instruction means providing instruction that meets the different needs of all students. Making this concept a reality in the classroom is complex. For the gifted student, it means the opportunity to advance as far as possible. For the struggling learner, it means offering support. Students have varying abilities, learning styles, interests, and needs. Differentiated Instruction attempts to address all of these areas. This workshop will teach you strategies to vary the content, process and product, while attending to the needs, interests and abilities of all students.

Five Foundations of Total Teaching

"Everything You Should Have Learned in College About Teaching...But Didn't"

Throughout history great teachers have been touted and praised for their genius in the classroom. Although these master teachers may have widely different styles, they all excel in the Five Foundations of Total Teaching. This workshop presents a systematic overview of these foundations and details their place in every educator's career. New teachers will learn what it takes to excel as a teacher and where to focus their professional development. For experienced teachers this workshop will clarify the discoveries of their years of experience, and give them a systematic approach for connecting all the components of their teaching. Administrators will gain key insights as to the specific areas in which they should be observing, guiding, and evaluating their teaching staff.

Improving Test Scores with Higher Order Questioning Techniques

Are you getting the answers you want from your students and test scores? Maybe you're not asking the right questions. In this workshop attendees will learn how to pose questions that will get their students to a higher order thinking level. Topics will include: how to form various types of questions, techniques for phrasing and leading questions. Organizational skills that will lead students to higher order thinking skills and a list of Power Words to focus toward specifics. Attendees will leave this workshop with all the tools they need to "ask the right questions" the very next day in class.

PARCC ELA Consortium

Problem-Based Learning (PBL)

Careers of the future will look very different and our children will need to be prepared with the ability to problem solve, think critically, and work collaboratively in a team environment. PBL is a valuable engagement tool to increase student interest and academic performance in any content area and grade level. PBL enables students to go beyond the information given and establishes life-long learning skills.

Raising Emotional Intelligence in Children

Raising children with healthy intelligence needs to be the priority in all public and private schools today. In this high-tech, fast-paced society, children are missing the necessary experiences for developing feelings of caring, sympathy, empathy and compassion. Join the presenter in promoting feelings of kindness, trust, self-regulation, appreciation, choice, and a strong sense of self.

Instructional Strategies

Teaching and Learning Through Multiple Intelligences

Curious about your strengths and weaknesses? We will assess ourselves and learn how to apply this information to the students within our classrooms. Best practices will be shared along with theoretical information on Multiple Intelligences.

Team Teaching: Making Classroom Supports Natural and Unobtrusive

There are two alternatives for increasing the range of behaviors that can be accommodated in a general education classroom.

- 1. Add resources, by adding a special education teacher as a collaborator with the general education teacher, provide the classroom teacher with an instructional assistant, or reduce class size.
- 2. Alter what the students are expected to learn and how they are taught. Evidence indicates that the supports that work best and continue to be used are those that fit naturally into the flow of the general education classroom.

This workshop will assist teacher teams in becoming successful in their roles, effect positive student change, and recognize those natural and least intrusive supports that are effective.

21st Century Themes and Skills

The ultimate goal for our students is to equip them with the skills needed to allow them to lead productive lives. The 21st Century Themes and Skills were developed to provide the framework for this goal. Participants are taken through the themes (core subjects) that have been updated in 2002 with a new focus on social studies, health, and the environment. Equally important, participants are presented with the skills needed for our future workforce to be successful: Learning and Innovation Skills; Information, Media, and Technology Skills; and Life and Career Skills.



Understanding By Design

This workshop takes the participant through the Understanding by Design framework created by Grant Wiggins and Jay McTighe. The "backwards design" curriculum plan is presented in all three stages (Desired Results, Evidence, Learning Plan). Teachers leave the training with the right tools to improve curriculum, better teaching and assessing skills, and an increased ability to present lessons that allow students to transfer their learning through real-world problem solving simulations.

Universal Design for Learning

Universal Design for Learning (UDL) is one of the most promising approaches for meeting the challenge of helping all students access the curriculum. It's an educational approach to teaching, learning, and assessment that draws on new brain research and new technologies to respond to individual learner variability. Our goals for developing a thematic curriculum unit or Classroom Universal Design for Learning Environment are:

- 1. Review the principles of UDL and use them to analyze existing classroom barriers to learning
- 2. Consider appropriate low and high tech resources that exemplify UDL principles to help all students overcome the barriers.
- Select appropriate resources to create this that focuses on Core Curriculum Standards, barrier-busting Curriculum, and Assessments that connect UDL principles with students needs to improve student achievement.



Language Arts/English

DIBELS: Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills

This workshop will familiarize participants with the use of DIBELS and what information it provides to the classroom teacher. These measures are research based and are designed to be short fluency measures used to regularly monitor the development of pre-reading and early reading skills. The results of these measures can be used to evaluate individual student development as well as provide grade-level feedback toward validated instructional objectives.

English as a Second Language

Instructional strategies designed to meet the needs of all students, from tried and true to new!

This workshop is designed for ESL teachers who want to increase their effectiveness in the classroom. We will examine specific techniques designed to help students acquire English and to increase motivation. Participants will leave this workshop with manipulatives ready for immediate use in the classroom.

Exploring the Writing Process

This workshop explores strategies and components necessary for implementing a successful writing program in the classroom. Learn how you can motivate and inspire the more reluctant learner to write with meaning and clarity.

Some of the tips and strategies include:

- Ideas for preparing your classroom for writing
- Activities/tools that promote pre-writes, rough drafts, editing, revising, and publishing
- Visualization techniques for encouraging meaning
- Use of organizers to enhance critical thinking skills and writing assessment
- Conferencing skills that promote more confident writers
- Ways to map out writing instruction across the grades and across the curriculum

Teachers, reading specialists, and administrators of grades K – 8 can leave this workshop with excitement and enthusiasm as well as a wealth of ideas to take directly to their classroom or school.



Holistic Scoring

Participants learn methods of consistent assessment scoring through the use of rubrics. In this workshop you will learn to define goals and expectations and to design tasks within those goals and expectations. Additionally, participants will learn to develop scoring systems and to teach students how to use these systems in their writing projects.

Literature Circles in the Language **Arts Literacy Classroom**

This hands-on workshop will provide practical strategies to help you incorporate literature circles into your reading and writing program. Several models of literature circles will be presented. By participating in literature circles, students will gain an appreciation of literature. They will develop inquiry and thinking skills, learn the elements of literature, develop social skills and much more. Handouts will be provided for classroom use.

Mini-Lessons for Reading and Writing

In this valuable interactive workshop teachers, will learn how to incorporate reading and writing mini-lessons into their language arts instruction. These classroom proven lessons are easily applied to guided reading, guided writing, readers' workshop, writers' workshop, and literature circles. A comprehensive handout packet will accompany this workshop.

Preparing Recent English Language Learners (ELL) for PARCC Reading and Writing

Just because students have passed the Maculaitis Assessment or the Language Assessment Battery, does not mean they're ready to pass the statewide writing tests. Students acquiring English need instruction in the qualities of good writing even as they are still translating between their first language and English. Participants will examine the special needs of students acquiring English and develop instructional techniques designed to prepare them to pass the writing portions of the statewide high school and Grade Eight tests.



Developing and Implementing Meaningful IEP's
