Subject Area(s): Early Literacy, Social-Emotional Development, Inclusive Education

Need: Describe the problem or deficiencies that exist which require the improvements described.

The population of preschool students is diverse in their development, physical, and sensory needs. Many children benefit from materials that are durable, engaging, and accessible. Traditional paper books are not always usable for children with fine motor challenges, sensory sensitivities, or limited attention spans. Without adaptive books, some students are at risk of disengaging from shared reading, missing opportunities to build vocabulary, comprehension, and a love of literacy. Adapted board books specifically offer predictable patterns, visual supports, and customizable interactivity that can teach core concepts, build life skills, and foster a positive, controlled reading experience.

Strategy: Briefly describe your plan to alleviate the need/problem.

An adapted book is any book that has been modified in some way that makes it more accessible. Adding moveable pieces, simplified text, and visually based comprehension activities to your existing favorite books can help increase student engagement.

This project will provide a collection of materials and board books for each preschool classroom to create adaptive board books to add to their classroom library. Teachers will intentionally integrate these books into large-group read- aloud, small group activities, and independent choice time. Creating adaptive board books will be beneficial for our inclusive preschool program because they enhance engagement, comprehension, and independence by providing interactive features, simplified language, and visuals that reduce cognitive load and make reading a hands-on, multi-sensory experience. These modified books cater to diverse learning needs and can improve vocabulary, build confidence, and develop crucial literacy and language skills.

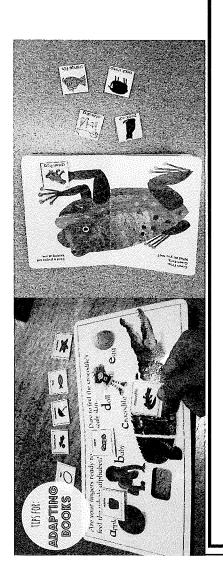
