I. GLASSBORO ALTERNATIVE EVENING HIGH SCHOOL Denise Barr, Head Teacher

As of December 31, 2019, there were 19 students enrolled in the Alternative Evening High School. Nine students have an IEP. One student has a 504. One student has a McKinney-Vento alert. One IEP student has been placed on homebound instruction per parent request. AEHS administration has met with the tutor to ensure instruction continues. McKinney-Vento alert student has been placed in Brookfield School, information to access APEX for continuation of education has been shared with them. Two students need counseling per IEP. Administrative staff has submitted a first draft of a handbook for the AEHS program awaiting further directions. They are anticipating a staff opening at the end of January and are working posting that position.

They are also concerned with the increasing number of students and a need for additional staff to accommodate the number of students in the program.

One student's last day was Wednesday, November 27, 2019 because she transferred to another school district.

During the month of November, the kindergarten BSI students worked on the following skills: phonemic awareness rhyme, syllable segmentation, phoneme

segmentation and initial sounds. Students reviewed the terms consonant and vowel. The upper and lower case letters L, H, K, P, J, W and V were introduced along with the sounds they make and vocabulary pictures that coordinate with each letter. A variety of multi-sensory activities using Orton Gillingham and Project Read strategies were used. The sight words put, has, up, to, down, over, he & she were introduced. One group began reading in a level A text.

All new students to Glassboro Public Schools in the 2019-2020 school year will be administered the following assessments to determine eligibility into the Basic Skills Program:

- Fountas & Pinnell Reading Benchmark Assessment
- The Phonological Awareness Profile (designed to diagnose deficits in phonological processing and phoneme/grapheme correspondence.) It is given based upon the results of the Fountas & Pinnell Reading Benchmark Assessment.
- The Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (set of procedure and measures for assessing acquisition of early literacy skills from Kindergarten through sixth grade that can identify areas of weakness in indicators of phonemic awareness, alphabetic principle, accuracy and fluency).

The next round of Fountas & Pinnell Testing will take place at the end of January to determine student exits from the program, new students identified as needing basic skills instruction and realign the groupings of students for each teacher.

Guided reading times have been created for each teacher and all basic skills instruction in 1st through 3rd will take place during that block of time. All basic skills students will be seen by their classroom teacher as well as receive instruction from a basic skills teacher for small group reading instruction.

At the beginning of 1^{st} grade, students should be reading at a Level E/F. They are currently able to service all students identified in the 1^{st} grade as Levels A – D (except for students in an inclusion setting).

At the beginning of 2^{nd} grade, students should be reading at Level K. They are currently able to service all students identified in the 2^{nd} grade as Levels A – I (except for students reading at Levels H-J in an inclusion setting and four students in a general education classroom setting who are reading at Level J).

At the beginning of 3^{rd} grade, students should be reading at Level N. They are currently able to service all students identified in the 3^{rd} grade as Levels A – M (except for students reading at Level K and M in an inclusion setting and two students in a general education classroom setting who are reading at Level L and M).

On Thursday, December 19th, one member of the Basic Skills Staff and two teachers at the Bullock School (Lynn McConnell, Amy Masso and Donna Romolino) chaperoned 26 first grade Basic Skills students at the Intermediate School for Santa's Workshop. Jennifer Budman, a teacher at the Intermediate School, along with the students of the National Junior Honor Society created a North Pole experience through stations for the students that included a Meet and Greet with Santa, coloring activity, arts and craft activity, reading station, math station, and writing letters to Santa. Each student was given a gift from Santa.

The 7th grade writing students are currently working on informational research papers. Students are using the MLA format to write a five-paragraph informational research paper on the topic of their choice. They are discussing hooks, thesis statements, how to write body paragraphs, how to write in-text citations.

Students learned how to complete an outline for a five-paragraph research paper. Students used credible sources to record and organize information for their writing. Student began by looking at model introductions and identifying different ways to hook readers.

In Integrated Algebra 1, solving and graphing linear inequalities using addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division were studied and taught. In addition, absolute value equations and inequalities were solved and analyzed. Several graphing calculator activities were used to aid in these studies.

Graphing Calculator Explorations are of constant interest and a great way of explaining challenging concepts.

Dr. Hickman held a follow up PLC meeting discussing SEL strategies and techniques.

Language Arts: Thomas Struck High School

Two students exited the program in December.

Mr. Struck administered MAP tests in September to assess strengths and areas needing improvement, as well as to assist in differentiating instruction. He also administered various classroom assessments.

The students read the first half of *The Things They Carried* by Tim O'Brien, exploring complex issues such as the tangible and intangible burdens of soldiers and the difference between truth and "story truth." Students are currently working on a writing assignment.

Students played Kahoot and QuizletLive to master vocabulary.

Students watched Ted Talks and select movie scenes to reinforce themes and ideas from the text they're reading.
